

#### We Are Easter People!

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! We think of this familiar greeting as a greeting exclusively reserved for Easter Sunday. But, for Christians, Easter is not just one day - it's a season of 50 days which we call Eastertide. Eastertide begins on Easter Sunday and lasts until the day of Pentecost, seven weeks later. This extended season gives us time to rejoice and experience what we mean when we say Christ is risen and that we, as the church, are the body of the Risen Lord.

During the season of Eastertide, Christians all over the world embrace these weeks as an opportunity to reflect on what it means for us to live as Easter people... to live the resurrection life. For several years, I have observed Eastertide by re-reading the late Eugene Peterson's brief book entitled, *Living the Resurrection: The Risen Christ in Everyday Life*. In this wise book, Peterson explores the Gospel stories of the resurrection through the eyes of the biblical witnesses. Peterson uses these stories as a

springboard to help readers reflect on how the practices and perspectives of resurrection life can transform our daily work, meals, and relationships. I highly recommend reading this little gem.

During the season of Eastertide our worship will focus on the joy of living the resurrection life. I hope you'll come and join with your Valley family in worshiping the risen Christ! Until then, I leave you with the words of an old Avery and Marsh song I first learned from the late Claude Ponting, a former pastor of our congregation.

Mark your calendars for April 21! That is the 12 year anniversary of Valley's chapter of Together Women Rise! Our chapter has faithfully met for that many years, even online during the pandemic, and has supported over 140 different nonprofit organizations that have lifted up girls and women in the global south. Together Women Rise is dedicated to achieving global gender equality. Rise has hundreds of local chapters across the U.S. where members learn about and


advocate for gender equality issues, give grants to organizations that empower women and girls in low-income countries, and build community to forge meaningful connections that increase our strength and collective impact. Our Valley chapter has donated over \$48,000 to these outstanding organizations during our 12 years as a chapter.

Come join us on Sunday April 21 at noon (please note the start time difference as we will have a congregational meeting after worship that day) for a potluck lunch, an engaging presentation about April's featured grantee and the opportunity to donate to their grant request. We will meet in Armitage Hall for our lunch meeting.

This month we will learn about and support the Dian Fossey Gorilla Fund's program Girls in Conservation. This program tackles education inequalities in Rwanda, gives girls opportunities outside the classroom, and promotes careers in conservation. This initiative selects aspiring female students in the secondary schools and provides them with life skills and practical conservation lessons; a female mentor living and working around Volcanoes National Park (VNP) in Rwanda; and a scholarship to continue their advanced level education in government-awarded boarding schools around Rwanda. The goal of this program is to increase school attendance, educational attainment, and paid opportunities for post-secondary school.

New members are always welcome and, if you are already on the Book Group email list, you will receive a reminder of the meeting.


#### **CROP Walk 2024**

If you multiply that number by the many prayers and good wishes knit into each shawl, Valley certainly has called up a strong army of prayer warriors that knit three/ purl three over and over (This represents the Holy Trinity.) as they create the shawls that will comfort, celebrate and provide a warm and needed hug to whoever might receive one.

April 14 will be Prayer Shawl Sunday at Valley. If you have received a prayer shawl in the past 19 years, please wear it to worship that day. If you are a member of the prayer shawl ministry, please be at worship that day to receive a special blessing. Also, starting in April, in Valley's Narthex there will be a rack with prayers shawls

#### **Storm Damage Updates**



Facilities Committee is pleased to announce that Jorgens Construction has been selected for our storm restoration project. They will restore the hallways and renovate the kitchen. We have started meeting with a designer and subcontractors to assess both improved functionality and aesthetics in the kitchen. Among other things, expect slight modifications to the layout, new lower cabinets and drawers, durable flooring and an updated color palette. This selection means a significant turning point in this project. We expect to be back to use in June.

Our rental house repairs at 8135 SW Cedar is also progressing. The tree has been removed and the fences rebuilt. House repairs as been contracted and should begin within a couple weeks. A roofing contractor has also been selected and expects to be done within a month.

#### **Earth Care Corner**

In light of the Earth Day Recycling Event at Valley on April 20, 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m., we will have several educational tables. There are three local companies new to Valley's recycling effort: Scrap, Untonne and Mama and Hapa's.



SCRAP is a donation-based creative reuse store and donation center. It is located at 1736 NW Alder Street. Their mission is to inspire creative reuse and environmentally sustainable behavior by providing educational programs and affordable materials to the community. They are a part of the SCRAP Creative Reuse network which has grassroots creative reuse centers across the country.

They carry all kinds of reused materials for arts and crafts—plus school, office, and party supplies. They also offer a small collection of new and necessary items, like glue and magnets. The inventory changes constantly so you never know what you're going to find!



Untonne was started to make climate change a non-issue for the next generation - and provide an easy solution for everyday people to help with that mission. Untonne connects you with emission reduction and reforestation solutions that have big ecological and humanitarian benefits. Options start at \$9.50/month. Such projects include purchasing solar ovens (see picture) that reduce the lung cancer that many women suffer from cooking over smoky pits.



Last to be at the recycle event is Mama and Hapa's Zero Waste Shop which has four locations. The nearest is located in downtown Beaverton at 12695 SW Crescent Ave. How it works is that their custom RFID system makes the dispensing of liquids contactless. No need to touch bottles or surfaces. They dispense by volume, not weight. Bring in any kind of container and fill it up! For example if you are out of shampoo for thick hair, head over to the shampoo barrels with an empty jar and leave your RFID card in its slot until the bottle is full. Delivery is also available to addresses in and around the Portland metro area.
